Dear Friends of Patriot Point,

What an exciting year it has been at Patriot Point as we continue making a significant impact for our nation's recovering service members, their families and caregivers.

As we near celebrating Patriot Point's 10th anniversary, it is amazing to look back and see all that has been accomplished over the past decade and in the past year. The property and programming continue to evolve as we welcome hundreds of guests each year to enjoy our little waterfront oasis.

A quick recap on 2025 at Patriot Point:

Through the first 11 months of the year, more than 400 guests visited Patriot Point, including nearly 300 active-duty and veteran service members. These guests have totaled more than 1,300 use days as guests took advantage of all that Patriot Point offers. Whether they hunted, fished from the dock or a boat, hit the water on a kayak or paddleboard or just enjoyed the solitude reading a book in the third-floor reflection room or sitting on the bench as they stayed for a day or most of a week, the feedback was overwhelming.

On site, we welcomed two new members to our team: retreat directors Allen and Robin Richmond, who are 32- and 24-year U.S. Navy veterans, respectively. We also welcomed one new Advisory Council member, U.S. Marine Corps veteran Marty Caraway, though Marty has been instrumental for several years in helping with Patriot Point's Wimps vs Warriors golf tournament.

All of our work could not take place without a strong network of supporters. We owe a special gratitude to everyone who donated materials, gave their time, discounted their services or offered to phone a contact and bring them into our circle. Thank you to everyone who has helped us continue this amazing journey.

“DO YOU WANT TO GO FISH ALONE, TOGETHER?”

Putting his kayak in the water and dropping a fishing line is Wilberto Marrero's way to escape. It doesn't matter if the fish are biting or his fellow fishermen are particularly chatty. Sitting in the kayak enjoying the serenity and calm water is enough to consider the day a success. It has been 16 years since Wilberto, stationed in Iraq while serving in the U.S. Army, was traveling in a U.S. Army armored fighting vehicle that was blown up by an IED.

“We were on one of the main routes and EOD came before us because we were carrying some important stuff,” said Wilberto, who served 12 years before medically retiring as a staff sergeant. “They came and swept the road, but between them sweeping and us getting out of the gate, something was planted.”

The next thing Wilberto remembers, he woke up in the hospital at Landstuhl Air Force Base in Germany. After leaving Landstuhl, he was transferred to Walter Reed National Military Medical Center in Bethesda before returning home to Fort Wainwright in Alaska.

Wilberto's physical and mental pain continues to this day. Wilberto does not like to fully discuss his injuries and he still requires more operations. He has traveled the country for surgeries and treatments. “I've been put back together with duct tape by the VA,” he joked recently, noting that he had another surgery scheduled the following week.

Wilberto now lives in York, Pa., and he has been to Patriot Point twice. The time spent there has been invaluable, he said. He especially enjoyed the camaraderie of sitting around the dining room table and eating while sharing personal experiences and not worrying about anyone making judgments.

And then there is the water. It's just like back home, where he often fishes with two other veterans.

“Hey, do you want to go fish alone, together?” is their standard way of making plans.

“You don't have to talk to someone,” Wilberto said. “Maybe all you need is companionship for a day or someone to sit with you in a corner and not talk, but not be alone. That's why I got into kayak fishing. We are not alone, we are together. I'm not invading your space or forcing you to do anything, but I'm here.”

After they get out of the water, that can be the time to talk, if needed.

In addition to enjoying his time on the water, Wilberto credits his service dog Ashton for helping in his healing journey. A 71-pound Black Lab trained in being around people with PTSD and TBI, Ashton can sense when even the slightest thing is off.

“If I start having a nightmare, she comes and puts her head on my chest,” Wilberto said. “As humans, we take little details for granted. But she picks up on triggers and comes up to me at ease, so I can continue with my daily routine.”

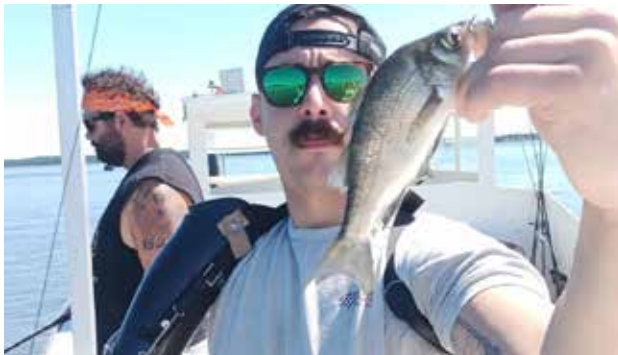
Ashton was named in honor of U.S. Air Force Senior Airman Ashton Goodman, who was killed in combat in 2009. Ashton and Wilberto recently visited a memorial to Goodman at Pope Army Airfield in North Carolina.

“Service dogs are the biggest blessing in disguise you can have,” Wilberto said. “As someone with multiple struggles and who suffers with social interaction, it’s a blessing. Working together, I actually have had my blood pressure under control the last few months. It is impressive how much she has helped without even knowing it.”

The event provides a first-class night out for recovering service members from Walter Reed National Military Medical Center in Bethesda, Md., and active-duty service members across the National Capital Region. Also among the guests was Medal of Honor Recipient, U.S. Marine Corps Col. (Ret.) Barney Barnum and U.S. Army Col. (Ret.) Greg Gadson, a former West Point football team captain whose military service culminated as the Garrison Commander of Fort Belvoir, where he oversaw daily operations of the post.

In the summer, the Military Bowl Foundation held its annual Wimps vs. Warriors golf tournament at two of the top golf courses on Maryland's Eastern Shore. The Warriors, a group of active-duty and veteran service members and first responders, took care of business, retaining their championship trophy in the Ryder Cup-style event.

But as fun as it was to hit the links and beat the "Wimps" – a group of patriotic Americans who are successful in their personal and business lives and also recognize the importance of supporting the nation's service members – it was even more satisfying to spend time together as a group.

"It was an absolutely amazing event," said Matt Savage, a 21-year U.S. Army veteran who took up golf through the Adaptive Sports Program at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center while recovering from a traumatic brain injury. "I really like the intimate feel of it. It's not blown out of proportion where, as a veteran, it's a dog and pony show.

"It's an intimate, immersive event, where we're with the Wimps or donors and can build a relationship and talk about things and they can get a better understanding of what Patriot Point can do and how veterans can use Patriot Point."

The group hit the courses at Talbot Country Club and the Links at Perry Cabin over two days for some heated competition. The Warriors lineup included several golfers who have competed in the annual Simpson Cup tournament between teams of injured service members and veterans from the United States and their British counterparts. U.S. Army MSG (Ret.) Eli Villanueva, a 22-year veteran who spent his last 11 years of service with a special missions unit within the Special Operations Command, tore up the course. He shot a 2-under par 70 at the Links at Perry Cabin to lead the Warriors to their victory.



“THE WORST DAY OF MY LIFE TURNED OUT TO BE THE BEST DAY FOR ME”

Jeddah Deloria remembers the first time he attended the *Home of the Free ... Because of the Brave* dinner. It was in 2008, when Deloria was being treated at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center in Bethesda, just starting his recovery from getting hit by enemy rocket fire while serving in the U.S. Army 173rd Airborne Brigade in Afghanistan.

Home of the Free ... Because of the Brave was still in its infancy after Paul Norman founded the event the previous year and held it in the basement of Morton's restaurant in Tysons Corner. At the time, Deloria felt very out of place.

“It was by far the nicest place I'd ever been,” he said. “I was very out of my element. But Paul assured me, ‘This is for you. Enjoy.’”



Ever since, Deloria – a Purple Heart Recipient for his injuries sustained in combat – has attended nearly every Home of the Free ... Because of the Brave. The dinner is an opportunity for sponsors and ticket purchasers – every day Americans -- to show their gratitude and support for service members, who enjoy a complimentary night out recovering from serious injuries. It also is a chance for attendees to lay the groundwork and network for civilian life. This year, for the first time, Deloria attended as a sponsor.

He still has the battle scars – metal fragments from the rocket-propelled grenade are in his brain and around his skull. Shrapnel is peppered across the right side of his body, which results in losing vision in his right eye. While that sounds awful, Deloria retains a positive outlook. He credits Home of the Free ... Because of the Brave for helping him get to this point, with a job in information technology, a family and a home in the Northern Virginia suburbs.

“It was because of Paul and a lot of other mentors that I found employment, randomly, in IT,” Deloria said with a laugh. “I turned down the job five times because I thought IT was like Geek Squad at Best Buy.”

Deloria had wanted to become a sponsor for several years, but Norman – now a member Military Bowl Foundation's Board of Directors -- kept telling him that his money was not needed. This year, Deloria pulled an end around, and just signed up online.

“I'm in the position I am because of what this event has done for me,” Deloria said. “At this point, I can give back.”

Born in the Philippines, Deloria grew up in Southern California. He was in high school in 2001 when terrorist events changed the world and he enlisted in the U.S. Army upon turning 18. He served more than 3 ½ years and medically retired as a sergeant in 2009. Now, he can joke that the surgical team at Walter Reed did great work putting him back together, including reconstructing both of his ear drums. He also had a traumatic brain injury from the blast, multiple lacerations on his right arm, three gunshot wounds (shoulder, lower back and thigh) and three herniated disks.

While his experience has been extremely traumatic and the road to recovery long, Deloria believes that everything happens for a reason and that where he is today is the product of his experiences.

“I am an eternal optimist,” Deloria said. “The worst day of my life turned out to be the best day for me.”
